The budget is out of balance with the unfunded liability of pensions. I am committed to fully funding these pensions, the drain on the general fund takes funds away from things like adding more police officers.

2. What is the biggest opportunity for your district or city during the next four years?

Biggest opportunity is the Google campus, the expansion of Adobe and the acquisition of land by Apple. In addition to bringing in more local jobs, this will

help us to expand and improve Diridon Station creating greater access for mass transit.
