Outside of my work for the City, I've taken on leadership roles in the community, including as a Board member of the Redwood Heights Association (my neighborhood association in District 4), I'm on the Board of the Oakland Asian Cultural Center. My son and I are active participates for various clean-ups in our district, enjoy the green space at Joaquin Miller Park, and the plays and music concerts at Woodminster. I have strong relationships with the small businesses in the District, and have the endorsement of the Executive Director of the Montclair and Laurel Business Associations.
