1. What do you see as the greatest challenges when it comes to providing residents with a livable, affordable and safe community?

Oakland has a great many challenges. These include lack of affordable housing, homelessness, inefficient city services, and inadequate fire protection. We also need better paying, good jobs for many struggling Oaklanders.

The biggest challenge to providing these is a City Council where our leaders are working against each other, mired in personality differences and not putting the needs of a majority of our citizens first when it comes to unified decision making.

I attended Oakland public schools, and after college, I came back to Oakland and worked at a ship supply company in West Oakland. I worked incredibly hard and earned an ownership interest in the company. I helped expand the business to 4 new locations, keeping our corporate headquarters in Oakland and creating hundreds of jobs in Oakland over 25 years. I sold the business in 2010 to the world's largest ship supply company, and became the COO of Wrist North America, overseeing 12 locations and 420 employees in the United States and Canada.

While I was running my successful business, I have also been dedicated to serving Oakland for 10 years. As a board member for the East Bay Agency for Children, I've worked to improve Oakland-based youth services. As a board member for the Oakland Feather River Family Camp, I've helped increase outdoor recreational opportunities for underserved Oakland youth. And as a supporter and funder of the Oakland Promise since its inception, I've been proud to help provide scholarships to disadvantaged Oakland youth, to help them attend the University of California.
