1. What do you see as the greatest challenges when it comes to providing residents with a livable, affordable and safe community?

Safety: We need to work to create a mutual trust between our community and the Police Department, and help support them in a model of community policing, and work to keep them accountable by supporting the newly formed police commission.

As far as Livable and Affordable: One can define liveable as a place where people can go to school, work, to shop, play and pray and feel safe. Affordability can be defined or described as spending 30% of your total earned income after paying rent, mortgage, interest payments and utilities.

Most people in Oakland are cost burdened meaning they are paying between 30-50% of their household income on housing!

We must set goals to bring more housing to Oakland. Especially affordable and Senior Housing. It is not just a matter of supply and demand.

Increasing the supply to catch up with the demand. We have brought in market rate housing but so far the trick down affest has not helped lower income folks.

Here are some ways to bring about Affordable Housing units in a rapid way: Promote the use of Accessory Dwelling Units. The time to get a project through the planning and permitting department has been bogged down by all accounts. We need to conduct an audit and fx this. This will reduce the time and costs of projects. Create a minimum of 5-10 % of senior or affordable housing into newly planned projects, or impact fees go to temporary rental assistance or down payment assistance programs. We need to create more pathways to home ownership so that working people have a shot to own, and create intergenerational wealth and plant deep roots which allow Oaklanders to remain in Oakland.

- 2. What is the biggest opportunity for your district or city during the next four years?
 - I think the biggest opportunities for our District and City is CIVIC ENGAGEMENT. Get people involved, volunteering and informed of the resources, problems and become part of the solution. Having an informed and engaged electorate is the best way to build Community. We have an opportunity in Oakland to approach the future of Oakland with our Kids in mind. Green our city by looking at ways to lessen our Carbon Footprint as a family and as a city. I would like to see more greenspaces in East Oakland, with street beautification, and a dog park. We need places and reasons to gather. I would like to see a walkable night in East Oakland similar to First Friday downtown. I want to build more community through sharing. Another big opportunity is the Cannabis industry. Oakland has a unique opportunity lay the groundwork for this budding industry. Excuse my pun.
