1. What do you see as the greatest challenges when it comes to providing residents with a livable, affordable and safe community?

Government corruption! For example, we spend some much on homeless, the more money we spend, the homeless we have. The more police we hire, the more property crimes and car-ins we face. We have lack of government accountabilities. The sanctuary city status has been promoting a wrong message for criminals to hide in San Francisco! The illegal drugs and drug dealers have been dominated our livelihood. Our housing crisis created by unfair housing policies. The ill-responsible or career politicians created a lot of mess for our residents such as helping the criminals to fight with the federal. Our moral is very low. Homeless suffer and die on the streets. When I elected as mayor, the first thing I do is to create an unit to fight off corruption to hold all government employees and elected officials accountable, put people in jail when I have too.

2. What is the biggest opportunity for your district or city during the next four years?

Political parties between democratic and republican. Our local government and the federal government are not in alignment to protect our public. President Trump said yes, government Brown said no. We the people, the public say yes, the city officials said no. It is lack of ethics at city hall right now. We need government reform to rebuild a better San Francisco. But it takes a lot of effort to find the right people to team up as one body to fight current corruption. When I elected as mayor, I will empower the public to advocate for themselves. I will train the residents how to navigate for public resources and hold all government employees accountable. In fact, my mission is to promote public awareness on how to run a self-regulated government, so our people power is at work, our democracy power is truly alive in San Francisco. 3. Describe your commitment to your district or city leading up to your bid for office.

I am a Family Social Worker and my main mission is to help people to recover from their crisis or hardship back to a normal state. I have no desire to be a mayor in power. I just want to stand up for all residents who obey the laws. I want to put law and order in place. If I am elected, I would be the most important leader to re-direct San Francisco back to the right direction. We are too left now. I was dominated by the San Francisco Coalition of Good Neighborhoods to run for this mayor's race. We, as one coalition from all 11 districts in San Francisco, have been fighting with the mayor's office and all board of supervisors against recreational cannabis stores open next to residential areas and next to facilities that serve minors. Yet, all the recreational cannabis regulations passed with loose restrictions. Ed Lee signed the legislation on 12/06/2017 and he passed away on 12/12/2017. We, the coalition did not finish our fight, so I was kicked out by this group to continue our fight by joining this special election. We fight to protect our children and youth from early exposure to drugs. Cannabis is still an illegal drug under the federal laws. We, the only group, has gone to seek federal help to stop local government misleading our public for illegal drug and illegal activities. Only God's love and hope can revive our deep city and deep state problems.
