

What did Ed Oliver do wrong? He was arrested for DUI after blowing a 0.0% at the scene, His blood work was clean, no drugs in this blood. Ed was tired driving home when the Montgomery County Sherriff's Department pulled him over. He was pulling his ATV on a trailer. Unfortunately, the way home meant driving through a construction zone, Ed was in a hurry to get home and rest.

Ed was pulled over under the claim that he had failed to stay in a single lane. Ed was given a field sobriety test and asked to walk in a line 4 times with and without shoes on. The officer claims he could smell moderate amount of alcohol on Ed's breath but when given a preliminary breathe test, Ed blew a 0.0%, no alcohol at all. While the officers claimed that they could see evidence of Ed being impaired, no real evidence was apparent at the scene. Ed was handcuffed and then taken to the hospital for blood work for drug screening and then to jail for the night.

Ed's license was also taken away, while he waited almost 2 months for blood work results. A video that appears to be taken by a police officer was leaked to the press and Ed is made out to be a reckless NFL player. The weeks pass as he waits for the results from his blood, that will clear his name because he did nothing wrong.
