Houston Imams and Rabbis on Events in Holy Land

For the past decade, we Imams and Rabbis in the Greater Houston area have found common ground on several issues that have impacted our respective communities and the Houston community at large. Although challenging, we have done so again during this tumultuous time.

Our relationship over the years has been rooted in a belief that each of our faiths strives to shape our communities in similar ways. We have come to understand both Judaism and Islam are communities that seek to sustain a relationship with God and build a sacred community through teachings that stress similar values.

We do not always see eye to eye, and from time to time, our needs and interests diverge. This misalignment is most acutely experienced concerning the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Following our most recent dialogue, we do, however, want people of all faiths and beliefs in our community at large to know the following:

- We pray together that the ceasefire is respected by all parties, bringing reprieve to all
 children and their families. However, this ceasefire is not a long-term solution and is only
 a temporary measure. We must continue to find constructive ways to move the
 conversation forward and find a solution rooted in justice and peace for all.
- 2. Our hearts are filled with sadness and anguish over the unnecessary and unimaginable loss of life in the Holy Land and throughout the region.
- 3. We stand against any actions by governments, militias, radical groups, and anyone else that would violate the sanctity of our sacred spaces. The freedom to practice our faith peacefully is paramount and must remain unhindered.
- 4. We condemn in the strongest terms any action that intentionally targets children and civilians.
- 5. We call on all people to show restraint and not allow our anger and anguish to divide our communities through Islamophobic, anti-Arab, and anti-Jewish actions and speech. Anything less would not be representative of our faith beliefs and has no place in seeking justice and peacebuilding.
- We remain committed to working together, learning from each other, and believe that communication and dialogue are even more critical during times of conflict and disagreement.

The disturbing realities continuing to unfold in the Holy Land must bring us together not only as Jews and Muslims but also as Americans to demand that President Biden and Congress play an active, constructive, and significant role in bringing about a just and lasting peace no matter how complex the process may be.

Through our interfaith dialogue and work, we have learned that our communities have many similar desires and needs, contrary to what many would want us and others to believe.

Together, we will forge a path forward through this dark time and identify ways to show solidarity and peace, and justice for all.
